## 1. Customer Service

### Monthly Customer Request Management System (CRMS) Report - April 2023

#### **Debtors**


The number of debts outstanding over 90 days has increased over the last month from 34 to 35, with the value decreasing from \$139k to \$137k.


In summary, 83.5% (\$115,000) of the debtors relate to 3 debtors.




## **Payment of Rates**

Rates Arrears has decreased from 2.1% in March to 1.9% in April, due to follow up actions by revenue staff.









## **Property Sales Data**

The number of Land Information Certificates (LICs) processed annually and year to date are shown below. LIC's are required to be provided by Council to property conveyancers to assist in calculating property settlement payments in relation to Council rates and charges outstanding against a property being bought/sold.

The volume of LIC's processed can provide an indicator of the buoyancy of the property market. The Mansfield Shire saw a slowing down in the property market in 2021-22. For 2022-23 the market has slowed down and more closely aligned with the 2019-20 figures. LIC and Property data is to the end of April.










The Financial Counsellor participated in a role play program for student financial counsellors via the STEPS agency, receiving written positive feedback for the contribution.



#### **Youth Program Overview**

#### Engage!

- Mansfield Secondary Breakfast Club remains incredibly popular with over 100 toasties served each week to students. The Youth Program attends and supports this initiative and engages with the students to allow them to voice their needs, develop ideas and then create events/opportunities for them based on the feedback received.
- April School Holiday program was a success with 22 youth participating in the three courses that were held in the holidays: barista, safe food handling and RSA.
- Planning for the Rainbow Ball continues.

There will be some re-structuring to some of the program delivery in May to comply with new funding body requirements.

#### **FReeZA**

► Two of 6 FReeZA events have been held to the year to date. A further four FReeZA events are scheduled for the remainder of the calendar year, one being the Rock Out concert in October.

#### **Future Proof Disaster Recovery**

► The team attended the Jamieson Emergency Services Expo with over 50 youth engaging with the team and enquiring about what the project was about, how to get involved and general youth program options.

## **Integrated Family Services**

During April Integrated Family Services worked with nine families facing a multitude of challenges including family violence, separation, disability and NDIS issues, isolation, poverty, limited access to services and educational issues. Staff in IFS have supported families with holistic case management, flexible funding, and connection to valuable referral points, as well as providing one on one personal support and parenting guidance.

## **Health and Quality**

#### **Jumpstart:**

The Mansfield Crawl and Play program will commence on 1 May at St Marys. This is a structured play program for children aged 0 -5 years facilitated by parents and a playgroup facilitator. This program will fill the gap of activities available for children of that age.

#### Respond:

A workshop titled "data and future discussion" was held in April with latest findings from the Respond program presented by Professor Steven Allender to compare 2019-2022 data. Some of the themes explored included: sustainability, data limitations, COVID impacts, embedding of program in local communities and ongoing health promotion.

### **VicHealth Local Government Partnership (VLGP)**

Mansfield Shire Council submitted a project plan and applied for module implementation funding to support the initiatives within the partnership and in April were notified that they were successful.

## **Regional Assessment Service**

Assessments have eased towards the end of April with no outstanding assessments due. Due to the ongoing high demand a second assessor has been helping with the influx of assessments and reviews to enable no outstanding cases at the end of this month.

Needs mostly identified as Homecare, Property Maintenance and Occupational Therapy.

IAT Live Trial has encountered many problems especially in relation to data.

#### **Courses attended:**

- Online and Digital Approaches to support wellbeing in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders
- Enhancing communication in Dementia Support
- Elder Abuse

The RAS assessment service will be partially moved to remote for the month of May with any in person assessments being conducted on an as needed basis.





- April 2023 is the highest revenue month on record for the Visitor Information Centre. A fantastic effort from all staff.
- ► The Library closed their temporary setup on Saturday 29 April. This was great exposure for the VIC with many people enjoying both facilities. They will be packing down and moving out over a two-week period.

### **Visitor Survey**

The Visitor Information Staff have recommenced gathering information from visitors to the centre. Looking at age ranges, origin of travel, reasons for travel and more. These figures have remained consistent throughout the survey's current lifespan.

- 39% of visitors were aged 60+
- ▶ 32% of visitors were aged 40 60
- **24%** of visitors were aged 18 40
- ▶ 49% were adult couples
- ▶ **79%** of visitors were here for a holiday over one day with **30%** staying 2 nights, **18%** staying 3 nights
- ▶ 57% of visitors to the VIC were visiting Mansfield for their first time

Most popular things were in order:

- Rivers, lakes and water.
- Bushwalking & outdoors.
- Attractions.
- Mt Buller.
- Food and Wine
- Craigs Hut

The most popular reason for visiting the information centre was for maps and directions followed by operator information, which has changed from road conditions and updates.

#### **Events**

## Merton Campdraft

This was the first Merton campdraft to be held in Merton at their new grounds. A great effort from all involved, unfortunately weather impacted one day of the three-day competition but overall, a great event. Council supported with:

- Water truck on standby that was not needed due to weather
- ► In-kind support for waste management

#### Mansfield Bush Market

The Easter market was very successful, with positive feedback received from stall holders and community. Council has been working with the new Bush Market Committee regarding their traffic management to identify some improvements required for future markets.

#### **Emergency Services Expo**

The Emergency Services Expo took place in Jamieson with over 20 organizations taking part. A great turnout with demonstrations and lots of knowledge and information available. Council officers attended to provide a wide range of emergency information and opportunities for the community to participate in current projects.

#### **ANZAC Day**

In March new regulations were put in place by the Victorian Government regarding accreditation of traffic management providers. This meant Council staff could not implement traffic management on Department of Transport roads, as staff were not accredited. This resulted in an unexpected cost for Anzac Day events taking place on affected roads, including events in Mansfield, Merrijig and Jamieson. To ensure that the events could proceed as planned, Council support was provided to the value of \$7,368. Council supported with:

- ▶ Paying for Traffic Guidance Schemes for Mansfield, Merrijig and Jamieson
- ▶ Paying for Traffic Management Implementation for Mansfield and Merrijig
- ▶ Implementing Traffic Management for Jamieson

#### Day On High

Day On High returned for its 12<sup>th</sup> year with food, wine and music along the main median strip in Mansfield. Council supported with:

Financial contribution towards music acts and audio requirements of \$1,500. In-kind waste support.

#### **Business Contact**

Council's Economic Development Officer continues to contact and engage with local businesses via personal visits, telephone, email and through Mansfield District Business Association. Engagements in April included continuing discussions on the Sustainable Tourism Plan, ongoing impacts of the closure of Morning Star Mine, Woods Point, funding and grant opportunities, Business Victoria training/support programs. 29 businesses were visited during April.

#### **Economic Development Strategy 2020-25**

Council's recent Economic Development Strategy 2020-25 Priority Review sought information surrounding investment opportunities in Mansfield Shire. Consultation with local businesses and real estate agents to obtain investment information has indicated the following:

- Investment queries have slowed over the past 6 months.
- ▶ 70% of sales were broadly for private holiday or principal place of residence.
- ▶ 30% sales included a mix of short-term rental, land banking, and agriculture.
- Local investors have been the main source of enquiry for commercial and/or industrial site development opportunities.

Investment opportunities identified:

- 1. Small numbers of short-term rental owners are turning towards long term tenancies.
- 2. Investment enquiries for High Street and Highett Street business premises are rising.
- 3. Commercial/Industrial land enquiries have increased in the last 3 months. Local agents are asking to be kept informed on progress of the Lakins Road area developments.

## **Better Approvals**


Support has been provided to businesses seeking assistance to commence operations in the Shire or to vary their products or services through change, expansion, or the creation of new entities. These included:

## **Refurbishment Update**

- ► The Library is on track to open on 16 May. The building is looking fantastic, incorporating elements that are charming, calm and reflective of the Mansfield environment, as well as prioritising the efficient use of space.
- The temporary Library at the Visitors information Centre closed on Saturday 29 April, allowing two weeks to finish building works, obtain sign off and set up the new space.
- Shelving has been installed.

- Friends of the Library have purchased activity boards and seating and a mat for the new children's area.


