1. Customer Service

Monthly Customer Request Management System (CRMS) Report – March 2023

CRMS statistics for the month of March show 131 customer requests registered with 39 requests remaining open and 92 being closed during the month.

Two complaints were received for March:

- An expression of dissatisfaction with council decision regarding road works completed on Moonah Road Bonnie Doon. Concern was raised regarding excess material left blocking a driveway after the road was graded and issues raised with the road surface. Resolution: The road has been inspected and the driveway access issue resolved. The road has been identified for re-sheeting in 2023-24.
- 2. A cemeteries client complained that they received no response to messages about ordering a cemetery plot.

Resolution: The customer was contacted, and the issue was resolved.

The majority (52%) of total requests opened were for Road Maintenance (Field Services) Road Maintenance requests consisted of (in order of frequency):

- Potholes,
 Drainage,
- Weeds and Vegetation and,
 Limb/tree removal.

Local Laws (31%) was the second largest group. Local Laws Requests consisted of (in order of frequency):

- Lost, Stray and Wandering animals,
- Euthanasia of injured wildlife,
- Litter, Dumped Rubbish and,
- Cat Trap Register.

At the time of the report there were 9 overdue service requests. Overall organisation performance is 93%


General Update

<u>DHHS Audit</u> – DHHS conducted their annual audit of Concessions Claims. Data was uploaded into the portal including current year and retrospective Concession Claims. A number of Ratepayers were selected as test cases for the Audit. No issues were found with the allocation of Municipal rebates.

<u>Revenue Managers Association Conference</u> – Several staff attended this conference in Bendigo over 2.5 days. The conference provided updates on a number of topics such as changes to the Local Government Act related to Revenue and the Fire services Property Levy.

Debtors

The number of debts outstanding over 90 days has decreased over the last month from 40 to 34 however the value has increased from \$125,001 to \$139,650. This is an increase of just over 10% from the previous month. A large planning permit amount was received however this was offset by an outstanding amount of \$60,000 from the Gough's Bay Progress Association.




89.5% (\$125,000) of the debtors relate to 4 debtors.

Payment of Rates

Rates Arrears has decreased from 2.5% in February to 2.1% in March, due to follow up actions taken by revenue staff on outstanding third quarter payments due by the end of February.


A 6 monthly review of hardship cases has seen a number expire without a request to reinitiate them. Rate payers have the ability to apply for hardship consideration at any point throughout the year. These requests are assessed against the hardship policy. The hardship policy will be reviewed in light of changes proposed in the LGA 1989 due in June 2023.

-Rate Arrears 2018-19-


Rate Arrears 2021-22 — Rate Arrears 2022-23




Property Sales Data

The number of Land Information Certificates (LICs) processed annually and year to date are shown below. LIC's are required to be provided by Council to property conveyancers to assist in calculating property settlement payments in relation to Council rates and charges outstanding against a property being bought/sold.

The volume of LIC's processed can provide an indicator of the buoyancy of the property market. The Mansfield Shire saw a slowing down in the property market in 2021-22. For 2022-23 the market has slowed down and more closely aligned with the 2019-20 figures. LIC and Property data is to the end of March.







Program Overview

Engage!

As at March 2023, the Youth Program has reached 69% of the overall participation target.

Additionally:

- Annual LEAD leadership program is scheduled for November 2023.
- Youth Development/ Life Skills workshops: Frequency of workshops is 1 per term; 3 workshops have been held in the year to date during the January school holidays with three workshops planned for the April school holidays.
- Youth Celebration: The North East Pride Collective (NEPC) Rainbow Ball is scheduled for 3 June 2023; a Rainbow Ball planning workshop with young people from across the North East was held in March 2023. Additional youth celebration events will be held throughout 2023.

FReeZA

- Two of 6 FReeZA events have been held this year to date. A further four FReeZA events are scheduled for the remainder of the calendar year, one being the Rock Out concert in October.
- The FReeZA committee assisted in organising and performed at the Disaster Recovery event held in the Amphitheatre.

Future Proof Disaster Recovery

- A Future Proof Disaster Recovery event was held 17 March 2023, and there were approx. 80 attendees.
- A Future Proof Disaster Recovery workshop will be scheduled to occur in the 2023 calendar year.
- Disaster Recovery ran a stall at the Tolmie Sports where they promoted the program to young people, emergency services in attendance and visitors

Integrated Family Services

During March 2023 Integrated Family Services have been working with families facing issues of family violence, housing, disability, NDIS access, parenting, family breakdown and others. Families are dealing with a shortage of accessible services in Mansfield and IFS have been utilising brokerage funds to assist families with crucial childhood assessments that they would otherwise not be able to access. Staff have also been engaging with vital preventative work such as involvement in region wide networks and community development projects such as the Goulburn Valley Public Health Unit Population Health Plan Consultation; Preventing all Forms of Violence and Reducing Injury.

Health and Quality

Jumpstart:

Mansfield Shire Council were successful in receiving \$14,000 from the VicHealth Future Healthy initiative JumpStart. This will enable us to run a structured play program for children aged 0 -5 years to fill the gap in activities available for children of that age. The program will commence on the 2nd week of Term 2.

Venue and timing have been confirmed, with promotion to occur in the coming weeks, including the registration process.

VicHealth Local Government Partnership (VLGP)

Planning continues for the VLGP and the requirements of a project plan. Council were eligible to apply for module implementation funding to support the initiatives within the partnership. This application has been submitted and waiting an outcome.

Attended a forum as held by VicHealth for Fast Track councils to discuss the Building Active communities' module and a second forum regarding the implementation of the first 2,000 days and the inclusion of this in the partnership modules.

GV PHU – Population health and prevention meetings continued through March with four additional opportunities to contribute to the population health plan planning sessions.

Regional Assessment Service

High demand for assessment services continues with increased referrals due to Care Finder and GP referrals. Clients are advised of a waitlist for services with some waitlist times of 12 months. IAT (integrated assessment tool) live trial to start 12 April 2023. This new assessment tool forms part of the Age Care Reform and the trial will run for the next 3 months.

There is a large demand for Occupational Therapy, Domestic Assistance and Property Maintenance. Many clients have an expectation of applying directly for a Home Care Package. Information is given to clients that utilisation of Commonwealth Home Support Program (CHSP) services is an eligibility criterion before progressing to Home Care Packages





Economic Development - Tourism & Events

The Great Victorian Rail Trail (GVRT)



- Art on the GVRT Project nearing completion with installations occurring now. One Mansfield work is in place near Bonnie Doon from Cara Johnson, with Robbie Rowlands work set for installation mid-April.
- A new MoU for the Rail Trail will be discussed at Management meeting mid-April.
- In late March the GVRT Industry meeting was held. Subscribers to the GVRT Industry newsletter were invited, with 22 attendees (usually there are 5 or 6). The Friends group and Rail Trails Australia were invited to speak about what they do and how they benefit the Rail Trail as well. There was lots of information and ideas shared and it was a great success.
- The Art on the GVRT Community Reference Group also met for the last meeting prior to installs of all the works. They were receptive to the final stages and ideas for further marketing. This was also a great chance to update them on the signage projects.
- Council is still waiting to hear from Agriculture Victoria around the proposed Donkey Treks along the GVRT.

Visitor Survey

The Visitor Information Staff have recommenced gathering information from visitors to the centre. Looking at age ranges, origin of travel, reasons for travel and more. These figures have remained consistent throughout the survey's current lifespan.

- 39% of visitors were aged 60+
- 31% of visitors were aged 40 60
- 24% of visitors were aged 18 40
- 48% were adult couples
- 78% of visitors were here for a holiday over one day with 32% staying 2 nights
- 56% of visitors to the VIC were visiting Mansfield for their first time

The most popular reason for visiting the information centre was for Maps and directions, followed by operator information which has changed from road conditions and updates.

Events

Mansfield Readers Writers Festival

The first Mansfield Readers & Writers Festival was a huge success with over 440 tickets sold.

The atmosphere, feedback and general community spirit around the entire event was fantastic. A mix of locals and visitors enjoyed a range of panel discussions, workshops, readings and Q&A sessions with award winning authors.

This event will return next year however the date will be moved so it does not coincide with other events on the calendar. As this is predominantly an internal event, the weather is not as important in considering the date for this event.

Council supported this first year with:

- \$1,500 towards marketing and promotion
- In kind support for hall hire, bins and equipment
- Event planning and set up assistance
- Promotional support as part of our March events push.

Mansfield Cycle Tour

With 236 entrants the Cycle Tour was a huge success. Businesses in town benefitted greatly from coffees, food and retail shopping over the weekend and accommodation being fully booked for the weekend as well.

Council supported by providing:

Tolmie Sports

Another successful running of the Tolmie Sports Day took place in March. The last three years have been difficult for this event with two cancelled during COVID and one from a lack of volunteers post COVID. This year they were back and running with a new volunteer base ready to rumble. The event featured all the classics and once again proved why it is such a popular fixture on the events calendar.

Stock Dog Spectacular

The stock dog spectacular took place from March 7 – 12 at the Mansfield Showgrounds. The event had record numbers of competitors and trials taking place. The organizer was extremely thankful for the support received from council. Spectator numbers were lower than expected. The event will return for 2024.

- organising food and coffee stalls, kids entertainment and first aid on Saturday and Sunday.
- watering of competition sites each morning of the events to reduce dust
- event promotion and event management support

Mansfield Pottery Festival

The first ever Mansfield Pottery Festival took place on Saturday 11 March from 11am – 2pm and was an overwhelming success. Council worked alongside event organiser Karen Pirie and her team to help facilitate the delivery of the new event. 39 stall holders took part, live music, food and coffee added to the atmosphere and kids clay play tables and demonstrations were also very popular.

An estimated 2,500 people came through the event site throughout the morning with the event extending till 3pm due to huge numbers. Stall holders and food providers reported significant sales.

Shop owners benefitted with many visitors flowing through the main street prior to and after their event attendance. The event will return for 2024.

Event behaviour was outstanding with only one incident recorded that required police intervention.

Tour De Trail

The third running of the Tour De Trail took place on Sunday 12 March in the morning along the Great Victorian Rail Trail. Over 120 entrants took place in two rides leaving Mansfield, one to Bonnie Doon and back, the other to Maindample and back. Run by the Friends of The Great Victorian Rail Trail, the event has grown in number each year with 85% of entrants coming from outside the Mansfield Shire area. After the ride they are greeted at their return to Mansfield with live music, espresso coffee, sausage sizzle and a show of Mansfield operators associated with the rail trail.

This event used to be supported financially by council and is a great example of the goal to assist events in their first two years to establish themselves and then seek funding from elsewhere or be able to support themselves. After two successful years the Tour De Trail was able to secure funding through the Bendigo Bank Community grant who have signed on as major sponsors for three years. The event will return for 2024.

Highline 2023

Overall, the event ran smoothly from a spectator's perspective. The main event had some delays due to strong winds. Some injuries were reported.

Some items to note:

- Spectator and rider numbers were generally down from last year.
- The silver level downhill event was not part of the event which affected rider numbers.
- Red Bull cancelled their sponsorship from Highline and other mountain bike events.

Several mountain bike events in Australia and New Zealand were held on the same weekend.

Some last-minute changes by the event organiser on the first day of the event brought with it extra work to ensure adequate safety measures were taken.

► The new road was completed allowing improved traffic movements through the site however some cars had to divert to a secondary track near the top of the new road due to a steeper section there.

- Ideas to improve the event will be discussed in an event de-brief.
- Event organisers have been asked for data on participants, spectators and vendors.

A debrief with key stakeholders will be organised in the next month.

Business Contacts

Council's Economic Development Officer Business Support continues to contact and engage with local businesses via personal visits and calls. Engagements during this month have included discussions on the continuing development of the Sustainable Tourism Plan, the Morning Star Mine at Woods Point announcement, current funding and grant opportunities, Business Victoria training and support programs. Engagement with 25 local businesses took place during March.

Business Supports

Council is working to clarify the impacts and effects of the Morning Star Mine operation at Woods Point. Currently a relatively small number of businesses are immediately impacted but the reach and scale of those impacts will be defined in the coming weeks as clearer data around cash flow and employment becomes available.

The GOTAFE Mobile Campus visited Mansfield for three days March with three staff on board.

25 engagements occurred along with a visit by the staff and Eco Dev Business and Industry to Mansfield Rudolf Steiner School. GOTAFE are introducing their expanded education pathways to the Steiner School and exploring commercial use of facilities at the school for future courses.


