COMMUNITY SERVICES DEPARTMENTAL REPORT FEBRUARY 2020

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT RELIEF AND RECOVERY

January saw a major emergency, with the State Government declaring a State of Disaster, including Mansfield Shire. The Abbeyard Fire, Rocky Knob and Bluff Creek Fires all had the potential to impact our communities.

Whilst, our community has not lost lives or homes, the fires and controlling risk had an impact. There was a heightened level of anxiety as well as the absence of tourists and holiday-makers and the impact this had on many local business was significant. The impacts of smoke on community is also on going as fires continue across the State.

A number of Council staff were involved in the response and recovery, many of who were on annual leave at the time and came in to do so. Working together to support the response agencies, Council assisted in the coordination and deployment of municipal resources and communications as well as preparing for the opening of a relief centre, should it have been required. A resident on the Vulnerable Persons Register was identified as requiring evacuation. He was supported by Council staff in alternative accommodation until assessed as safe for him to return home.

A community forum was held at the Mansfield Performing Arts Centre to provide an overview of the current situation, information from the various response and support agencies and how to prepare for the rest of summer. Approximately 200 people attended the forum as well as those who listened to the livestream via Mansfield Community Radio or on Council's Facebook Page. The feedback from those who attended as well as the other agencies was that this event was well received by the community.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Sport and Recreation

4,395 people visited the Mansfield Swimming Pool in January. The total visitation for the season year to date is 10,554. Council is now a licenced operator of Life Saving Victoria Swim and Survive Program, with swimming lessons for both children and adults being offered in a 6week block covering January, February and March.

Communications and engagement commenced on a project to upgrade View Street to improve access to the new dual court stadium. Activities included a mail out to neighbouring properties and key stakeholders, press release, information on social media and Council's. Information was displayed at the Mansfield Bush Market, and interested community members were invited to view the preliminary designs at a community drop in session. Approximately 25 community members attended.

A naming process is also underway to seek community input to naming the sporting precinct at the end of View Street, consisting of the new dual court stadium, dual outdoor multi-purpose courts and existing playing fields.



Youth

The Youth Services team started the year welcoming a new member, Earl Ree-Goodings. The whole team visited Mansfield Secondary College during the first week of school to host a BBQ for year 7s and to introduce themselves and the services available.

A successful program of activities and events were held over the school holidays including:

Mexican themed cooking

- A Pizza Party (including making the pizzas)
- Magic: The Gathering (a card game) with a professional player from Melbourne
- Activities at the Mansfield Pool

The FReeZA Team hosted a Pool Party at the Mansfield Pool over the Australia Day weekend with 200 party-goers attending.





The L2P Program is close to capacity with 12 Learners being supported by 10 mentors. One learner has just exited the program, achieving their probationary licence.

Mansfield Library

January was an extremely busy month at the Mansfield Library with nearly 5,000 visits.



Financial Counselling

The current caseload for Financial Counselling remains high with an approximate wait time of 2 weeks. The State Peak Body, Financial and Consumer Rights Council (FCRC), officially changed its name to Financial Counselling Victoria (FCVic). Financial Counsellor, Michele Padbury, put her expertise and knowledge for financial counselling, coupled with her experience in emergency management, to great use participating in three Statewide facilitated phone meetings contributing suggestions for the pre-deployment training and support needs for financial counsellors travelling to North East Victoria and Gippsland to assist fire affected areas.

Integrated Family Services (IFS)

IFS is in the process of preparing for an accreditation review in March, and as such staff are taking the opportunity to assess and improve documentation and processes against best practice principles, in order to align with funding requirements.

Supported Playgroups

The multipurpose room at the Family Services building has had an upgrade to include stepping stone pavers, an edible garden and visual improvement.



Maternal Child Health Service

Danielle Ryan-Gledhill, Social Service Co-ordinator for Rural and Regional St Kilda Mums Organisation, delivered a car full of material aid for families in the Mansfield Shire. MCH staff are very excited and thrilled to be able to provide more resources to those who are in need.



Aged and Disability Services

Planned Activities Groups (PAG)

The first week back after the Christmas break for the Men's Group was a tour of the Bonnie Doon old township and around some of the Lake Eildon area. Clients enjoyed the hive of activity of boats and water skiers. Passing the 'The Castle' house created lots of conversation.

The group celebrated Australia on 20 January with lots of red, white and blue decorations. Some of our members came dressed in the spirit of Aussie attire. Lamingtons and meat pies for morning tea and a BBQ lunch set the flavour for the occasion. Lots of Aussie trivia and jokes were shared before some incidental exercise.



ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Events

No event activity except for the two main markets – Farmers and Bush Markets.

Tourism

Due to being a Declared State of Disaster during January, area visitor numbers were down. The Visitor Information Centre recorded 1,866 - down 46% on same period last year. Merchandise sales also took a hit with a 70% decrease.

A Bushfire Recovery film shoot was coordinated between Council and Mt Buller to provide fresh new images for all our businesses to use to assist in getting visitors back. The shoot covered walking, cycling, fishing, horse riding, family camping & river fun and consisted of still, moving and drone imagery.

The tagline for the promotion was 'No Better Time'.

Economic Development Strategy

Urban Enterprise has been appointed to undertake the Mansfield Shire Economic Development Strategy, Community Engagement and Industry Consultation.

Urban Enterprise facilitated engagement workshops and a survey during January, with the workshop feedback and survey results to form part of the input for the strategy.

HUMAN RESOURCES

As Momentum One withdrew from the contract to provide labour for the Resource Recovery Centre, Council has now employed Mark McKenzie, Matt Merchant, Dan Bretherton and Mitch Ramadan as Resource Recovery Centre Operators on a fixed term basis through to 30 June 2020.

Records and Customer Service Officer, Kim Kipping, has resigned her position with Council effective 28 February 2020, and Kym Killeen (who has been working in a casual capacity across Waste, Records and Customer Services and as a School Crossing Supervisor) has been appointed to the 0.5 eft Records and Customer Service Officer role.

Due to an extended period of leave, Kathy Stone is providing backfill in the Infrastructure Administration Officer role.

CUSTOMER SERVICE

Customer Service have been extremely busy with enquiries especially during the period when our Shire was impacted by the declared state of emergency. The customer service team provided support outside of normal business hours and in the process became more familiar with the use of Crisisworks, Shared Emergency Management software, which was extremely valuable for the organisation.

CRMS statistics for the month show 262 customer requests registered with 54 open requests and 140 closed during the month. The majority of requests opened were for Field Services (43%) with Local Laws (23%) as the second largest group. There were 30 overdue requests.

ENVIRONMENT UPDATE

Roadside Weed Control

Roadside weed control is progressing well with the Gough's Bay and Macs Cove areas complete.

The remaining areas for treatment this season will occur in February and March 2020.

Mansfield Shire Council Environment Advisory Committee new student representatives

Two secondary college students have nominated to participate on Council's Environment Advisory Committee this year. Meg Boag and Cecelia Walker who are both completing Year 12 will attend their first meeting in February.

Meg and Cecelia are members of the Secondary College environment committee and are interested in implementing a number of environmental sustainability projects at the Secondary College this year such as reducing waste from the school canteen.

Distribute Energy Resources Marketplace

Environment Officer Damien Gerrans met with Mondo Power representatives about a distributed energy resources marketplace trial. The trial will look at how locally generated electricity can be shared.

Mondo are seeking trial sites to investigate how a more diverse distributed energy generation and storage network would work in regional areas. Trial sites would ideally contain a mix of residential and commercial energy demands.

Mondo have also offered to work with local government to support assessment of renewable energy generation opportunities on public buildings. These opportunities will be further explored in the development of the Mansfield Shire Council Climate Action Plan.







COMMUNITY REBUILDING ROUNDTABLE WITH SIR PETER COSGROVE

RATES


In January 2020 the State Government released a preliminary report on the Local Government Rating System Review, summarising the issues raised during public consultation.



INFRASTRUCTURE DEPARTMENT REPORT February Meeting 2020

FIELD SERVICES

Grading commenced the second week of January with the completion of School Lane, Purcells Lane, Davies Road and Powers Road in Merrijig, and Old Tonga and Goodwills Roads.

The recent storms kept the crews busy as a result of significant damage to trees, fences and infrastructure.

A fantastic team effort to clean up the town and surrounding areas in such a short time.



PARKS & GARDENS

Prior to the storms the Parks and Gardens team had commenced street tree pruning along Highett Street. Watering was still taking up time with some hot days earlier in the month.

Preparations for Australia Day were put on hold as storms hit the town centre two working days before the event. It was a credit to the entire team who pitched together to clear the debris to present the town in amazing condition for the day.

MAINTENANCE

CRMS maintenance, fault and safety requests continue to rise with 73 currently outstanding. The increase is due to the competing demands and revised timelines for implementation and delivery of capital works projects, preparation of tenders, RFQs and contract extensions.

CEMETERY

A famil of the cemeteries was completed this month with Depot Admin. Officer, Kathy Stone and Parks and Gardens Supervisor, Heath Aromataris. Kathy will be back filling the Infrastructure Administration Officer role while Anne Edwards is on extended leave.

There are a couple of areas that require attention, namely fencing at all cemeteries and the old niche wall at Mansfield Cemetery. We will look at working on a fencing upgrade project over an extended period and will also work on obtaining quotes for refurbishment of the niche wall.

During January there were two burials at Mansfield Cemetery and an ashes interment at Jamieson.

CAPITAL WORKS

The construction and sealing of 550m of Withers Lane is well under way and due for completion late February/early March. Kerb and channel and drainage works have been completed on the majority of the road with a seal expected to be applied the north section of the road early February. An unexpected AC water main was discovered at the intersection with Maroondah Highway which has impacted the contractor's ability to complete this section of road. Council officers are currently working with the contractor and Goulburn Valley Water to get this issue resolved as soon as possible.





The resheet program has commenced and is due for completion March. This year's program will include approximately 17km of Council's unsealed road network. During January roads that have been resheeted include Donkey Hill Road, Magill's Lane, Royal Town Road, Woolshed Lane, Mitchells Road and Donaldsons Road.

Remedial works on Barwite Road have been undertaken by Council's Field Services Department to ensure the road is safe for use for the Jayco cycling tour. The contractor has been unable to get to site in January due to being deployed to the fires in North East Victoria. Works by the contractor are expected to be completed by April. This will include repair of failed areas, drainage and verge works.

The Roundabout Toilet Renovation contract has been awarded and works have commenced onsite. Works include wall tiling, floor coating, new toilet pans and new basins and tapware.
