Debtors


The number of debts outstanding over 90 days has slightly decreased over the last 2 months to 21 with a value of \$85,784. This is as a result of clearing some outstanding accounts related to community services. One debtor is worth more than half of the debt at \$45,000 related to a planning permit.



Payment of Rates


Rates and charges for 2022-23 were issued 1 September. Third instalment notices were issued on 7 February for payment by 28 February.

58 objections were lodged with the Valuer-general of which 26 have been returned and processed. A further 32 are still outstanding.



Rates Arrears has decreased from 2.7% in November to 2.3% in January.

The number of property assessments accessing hardship arrangements had a slight increase to the end of January.




Property Sales Data

The number of Land Information Certificates (LICs) processed annually and year to date are shown below. LIC's are required to be provided by Council to property conveyancers to assist in calculating property settlement payments in relation to Council rates and charges outstanding against a property being bought/sold.

The volume of LIC's processed can provide an indicator of the buoyancy of the property market. The Mansfield Shire saw a slowing down in the property market in 2021-22. For 2022-23 the market has slowed down and is more closely aligned with the 2019-20 figures. LIC and Property data is to the end of December.



Emergency Relief ER update – Mansfield & District Welfare Group M&DWG

In January there were 13 requests for assistance, totalling \$1,517:

These figures include assistance provided via Social Worker (Mansfield District Hospital), Integrated Family Services/Maternal and Child Health.

Health and Quality

- Respond Implementation Network meeting held in Mansfield for the first time since COVID which provided an opportunity for visiting LGA's and health promotion teams to discuss the success of Respond in Mansfield and show off the initiatives in place.
- 16 Days of Activism As part of the 16 Days campaign the Centre Against Violence brought a roadshow to Mansfield with service providers, roadshow was attended by local professionals in Mansfield. Providing a network opportunity to meet services that don't always come to the area.
- HDAA Audit Preparation well underway for the Integrated Family Services Reaccreditation audit in February
- Heart Health Checks On 10th December Respond, Mansfield Shire Council, LouFit Personal Training and Nurses and General practitioners from Mansfield Medical Clinic and Central General Practice hit the streets to conduct heart health checks, following on from Magda's Big Health Check. The initiative was well received and provided opportunity for discussion to continue educating the community through different topics.
- Network Meetings Agenda planners complete and ready for review, meetings to commence from February.

Youth Services

Engage!

The Youth Program experienced some service disruptions in 2022 following a service review and restructure, however the Youth Program was able to achieve (and exceed) overall participation targets, achieved by 146%.

The Youth Program school holiday program ran from 11 - 25 January 2023 where the events and activities were underpinned by the three priority areas in the Youth Strategy Action Plan (2019-2023), 'to connect, develop and support our young people...'

Activities and events included:

- Yoga in the park (12–17-year-old; 18–25-year-old)
- The Flying Fruit Fly Circus Workshop (12–17-year-old)
- Games Afternoon at the Youth Centre (12–17-year-old)

Additionally, there were the FReeZA events:

FReeZA

In 2022, there were several disruptions to FReeZA and planned events through the North East floods in November, which resulted in two events being cancelled (Rock Out and the Skate Park event). Program targets were however achieved, and participation targets exceeded being achieved by 114%. The Youth Program are re-engaging young people to join the Committee.

Integrated Family Services

In December and January Integrated Family Services continued to support families dealing with issues ranging from grief and loss, serious mental illness, family violence, parenting, blended families, child and adolescent behaviour and the impacts of trauma.

The service system in which we work is still being affected by staff shortages and illness, making the usual referral pathways for families even more problematic than usual. We continue to work alongside Child Protection and our Ovens Murray Alliance partners such as The Orange Door during these challenging times to provide families with the support that they require.

The school holidays can present families with opportunities to spend time together but can also engender stressful situations where conflict may increase. Some families can feel more isolated over the holidays when their connections with school communities are absent. Also, some visiting services and other supports are not available over the Christmas break. During this time, IFS have been supporting families to manage stress, stay safe and well, and build upon their strengths in order to develop their capacity to cope.

Aged Care

Community Connections

Assisting clients with My Aged Care access. Reviewing feedback on current services and access. Planning first Bonnie Doon visit to Community Centre.




The Great Victorian Rail Trail (GVRT)

December saw an increase in rail trail numbers as would be expected. Mansfield has a lower count than 2021, however Bonnie doon has an increase. Merton counter needs to be looked at as it has shown a number that is definitely incorrect, perhaps something triggering the sensor.

January had fantastic numbers along the Rail Trail with an increase of 1887 or 19.5%. Merton counter has levelled out now from last month. Bonnie Doon has seen a larger increase which could be attributed to increased numbers around the lake and general increase in visitation across the board.



- The Great ARTdoors update Works are well underway being manufactured at various sites with installs to start in March. Cara at the Bonnie Doon site has begun revegetation and we are looking at launch events for April.
- New picnic tables have been setup at the start of the Rail Trail and have seen usage already. A great spot to have a sit and read a book from the temporary Library location as well.
- Maintenance of the trail has slowed down now thanks to rain easing and it is all open and looking good.
- Council is currently in talks with a possible donkey trek to take place along the rail trail in February.
- The Great ARTdoors update Installation of footings for artworks is scheduled to start mid February with a launch event currently being planned.



Mansfield Visitor Information Centre (VIC)

[**December**] The VIC has seen a steady number of visitors, enquiries, and sales. On par with 2021. Interestingly not a big increase as expected of visitation with other water areas closed.

Visitor Survey

The Visitor Information Staff continue to gather information from visitors to the centre. Looking at age ranges, origin of travel, reasons for travel and more. These figures have remained consistent throughout the surveys current lifespan.

With the significant rain and tracks reopening soon there has been a large increase in trail, 4wd track condition reports. Attractions jumped up as to be expected at this time of year.

Citizenship Ceremony – Thursday Jan 26

Mansfield Shire Council held its annual Citizenship and awards ceremony on Thursday 26 Jan in the Botanic Park. This is the second year the event has run in this location and once again it proved to be a successful location.

An estimated 300 people attended to see new citizens welcomed and a range of awards for local community groups, events, and citizens efforts.

Supported by Rotary with a free BBQ, MAD Orchestra providing the soundtrack and contributions to the ceremony from the local scouts and guides groups, the High Country Cattlemen and a local Ambassador saw a fantastic ceremony take place.

Horsepower In The High Country – Saturday January 28

Mansfield Shire Council and Delatite Drivers Car Club teamed up to deliver the 'Horsepower In The High Country' event on Saturday 28 Jan. This event was a combination of a car show n shine and an Australia Day weekend celebration funded by the Federal Government Australia Day grant.

The event saw over 2000 people come through the Mansfield Botanic Park to see over 250 cars on display, live music, food and drinks and kids entertainment. The feedback for the event has been amazing and the car club used this as an opportunity to raise money for Mansfield Autistic Statewide Services (MASS) with car entry and donations seeing over \$7,000 raised for MASS.

Alongside this Rotary sold over 800 sausages and cold drinks to raise over \$3,000 for their work in the community. Council also worked together with Parkrun, a regular Saturday morning event at the park to ensure it could still go ahead. They had their highest number of entrants since their launch with 93 participants

Business Contacts

Council's Economic Development Officer Business Support continues to engage local businesses with visits and calls.

- In December 27 businesses were visited with most engagements including discussions around funding and grant opportunities, training and ongoing support programs.
- In January 23 business were engaged with most including discussions around visitor numbers and staffing, funding and grant opportunities, training, and support programs.

Business Supports

Council continues to provide support to the Mansfield District Business Association in facilitating the provision of further virtual and face to face business training workshops, advocacy and support to membership, and advice sessions for local business with Business Victoria in partnership with Monarch Institute.

Businesses directly booked into training sessions online for January. 4 applicants registered and Business Victoria decided to run the workshop via Zoom. Economic Development Business and Industry hosted the workshop and awaits feedback from "Monarch" who conducted the session. Bookings are currently being taken for the 15 February workshop "Cyber Security" from Monarch/ Business Victoria. These workshops are highlighted within the Mansfield Shire Council "Business Matters" Newsletter and offer online training sessions and, if numbers are high enough, the opportunity for face-to-face training at Mansfield Shire Council facilities.

The Mobile Coffee Van project, to support expected increased visitor numbers, has been conducted through the Christmas/ New Year/ January holiday period. By January 9, the Bonnie

Doon sites were judged to be so low as to not require further service. The operators were offered options to work separately or in concert at the Visitor Information Centre. One operator accepted the offer and continued at site for a further week before visitor numbers dropped and service ceased. One operator has continued at the Botanic Gardens with that ending on 28 January – having been included to operate within the Horsepower in the High-Country event.

Better Approvals

GOTAFE Mobile Campus

The Mobile Campus had its 3rd visit this year, to Mansfield on the 6 December. Two staff (student attraction officer & careers advisor) were on board for the three days.

37 engagements occurred during the December GOTAFE visit.





TELSTRA Roundtable Meeting

CEO Kirsten Alexander and Economic Development Officer - Business and Industry met Telstra's new CEO, Vicki Brady, Telstra Product & Technology Group Executive, Kim Krogh Andersen, Telstra Regional General Manager, Jenny Gray and Telstra Enterprise General Manager, Glenn Campbell for round table discussions on regional digital advancement. Telstra were keen to hear of the issues facing LGA's of Hume Region during this fact-finding tour. The Telstra Shop on Wheels will return to Mansfield, 18 January 2023.

Mobile Telstra Shop Visit & Advocacy

Telstra's visit to Mansfield was deemed to be a resounding success by both the staffing team and the customers who steadily visited the site in High Street from open to close throughout the day. Estimates of up to 70 or 80 customer service/ assistances were dealt with by the Telstra team. Whilst the Telstra team are committed to return visits, Council continues to advocate for a more permanent solution including a partnered business or dedicated outlet to service the customers who clearly require more than a visit for a day a month.

Contact by a new resident in the Bonnie Doon area has provided further advocacy opportunity in January, with the enquiry coming from a renowned software systems developer who has purchased in the Maintongoon area. Telstra have been quick to respond and are now working on potential solutions for the precise location with the enquiry. All details have been provided to ITAG via Dr. Helen Haines MP.

NBNCo Visits & Community Session Planning

NBNCo are planning to include community sessions to their visit in March whilst engaged briefing Mansfield Shire Councillors on future planned infrastructure works and emergency STAND facilities – including upgrades of fibre to the premises, to properties within Mansfield township. Details will eb included to a communique to Councillors soon. The prior NBNCo visit saw the Muster vehicle unable to connect to its satellite and has undergone examination and repair to a fault that was discovered in the onboard computer system.

Library

20 adults and 35 children attended the Christmas Storytime Extravaganza.

- This year 4 local musicians volunteered their time and expertise to accompany the carols and songs. Volunteers looked after the families and assisted the children making Christmas Angels.
- Our volunteer Santa Claus handed out library gift bags to all the children, containing books and rainbow pencils purchased by Friends of Mansfield Library. Local craftswomen, Annie Folk and Andrea Button generously donated their time to Crochet handmade stars onto the pencils.





Library Sector


Public Libraries Victoria Network have reported that the temporary interruption to the State-wide loan service will be resolved in March or April next year. A contract with a new courier service is being developed, though access to items may be reduced.



The top performing post over the December/ January period was the promotion of the Horsepower in the High Country Australia Day Event with a reach of 20,583 which was a staggering 1,448% greater reach than the median post of 1,330.

The highest reaction received on a post was in relation to the passing of Val Gray, with over 700 reactions and 124 comments.

Lost animals always receive a large amount of engagement which ensures a good rate of reach and engagement, often resulting in a good outcome for the animal. The post on the English Pointer rescued was shared 78 times.


Engage Portal


