The Hon. Anthony Albanese MP Prime Minister Parliament House CANBERRA ACT 2600

Dear Prime Minister,

As members of the Border Medical Association (BMA) and as concerned clinicians, we write to request federal intervention in response to clinician and community concerns regarding the current proposed redevelopment of Albury Hospital.

The BMA, alongside other health professionals and our community, has long advocated for a new single-site hospital for Albury Wodonga Health (AWH), the only cross-border health service in the nation.

In October 2022 the New South Wales, Victorian and Federal governments made an illadvised commitment of \$558 million to redevelop the Albury campus. This commitment came in face of a recommendation for a greenfield hospital. A single-site hospital was supported by both state governments following the release of the AWH Clinical Services Plan in 2021. It is now apparent that support of the States has dissipated, without consideration of the impact on patients or the community.

The BMA has repeatedly raised major concerns regarding the redevelopment with the New South Wales and Victorian Health Ministers, as well as seeking representation to the Federal Health Minister. Frustratingly our concerns continue to be ignored.

If realised, this redevelopment will cripple healthcare services in the Albury Wodonga region for a generation, undermine regional workforce recruitment and retention, and disincentivise major training and education institutions from investing in our region.

Ultimately, it is our patients who will continue to suffer due to the failure to address critical clinical shortcomings.

It is unacceptable that AWH currently operates two undersized regional hospitals merely ten kilometres apart. Splitting of key services threatens safe patient care on a daily basis and leads to inefficiencies and duplications. The risk to patient safety is compounded by perilous deficits in bed capacity, operating theatres, outpatient clinics,



renal dialysis, critical care services and support services. Unfortunately, the proposed redevelopment of the current Albury site will see all of this continue unabated.

The release of the concept plans in August 2024 by NSW Health Infrastructure include drastic compromises to the scale of all departments and services. These compromises are a consequence of the New South Wales and Victorian state governments providing an arbitrary and grossly inadequate funding commitment, and then cutting healthcare capacity and services to fit.

The capacity spelled out in the concept design will barely cover current clinical demands let alone any growth, with a net increase of approximately 35 acute beds. This comes as the capacity that was planned for in the 2021 Clinical Services Plan was serially slashed without recognition of the current deficits AWH faces, let alone the size and scale of the service. There is now insufficient capacity to decant hospital wards leaving the Albury campus hamstrung in terms of any further development. A costly, protracted and disruptive staging plan would be subsequently required for further development.

As it stands today, there is no single site hospital on the horizon. There is no government commitment to any further stages. Patients and staff will be forced to remain in the dilapidated wards of Albury Hospital. Design, functionality and safety are all compromised as the footprint is far too small.

If realised, this redevelopment plan will lead to the same issues for patient care that we face every day. The service will still be strewn across two campuses, and the capacity will not be sufficient to cover our current deficits. This is despite the two states previously committing to a single site hospital, following the recommendation of the 2021 AWH Clinical Services Plan.

We have written to the New South Wales and Victorian Premiers calling for:

- 1. A halt to the current redevelopment plans.
- 2. Immediate capacity relief through construction of modular wards and operating theatres. We need relief urgently.
- 3. A return to the original Clinical Services Plan (2021) points of care projections and a commitment to fund the 15+ year infrastructure requirements spelt out for a new single-site hospital on a new site.



The intransigence of the states in the case of AWH has been shameful. The need for federal intervention is clear.

There are multiple examples of where the federal government has participated in hospital developments. There are several mechanisms under which this can be considered, as spelt out in the National Health Reform Agreement.

There are opportunities for the Albanese government to commit through:

- 1. Reopening the case for the Albury Wodonga Regional Deal which held a new hospital as its signature infrastructure request. This deal was hamstrung by the politics of sparring governments at the cost of our community
- 2. Defence investment to support AWH being the lead health education precinct for defence personnel.
- 3. Reviewing options of funding from the Federal government that could include repayment or lease arrangements with the States. This would be the simplest approach rather than attempting to drag the states to comply with the duties they have so far failed.

Long ago identified by the Whitlam government as a centre of regional and urban development, Albury Wodonga is now rapidly growing with strategic transport, defence and industry links. Future economic expansion of this important region will be compromised without delivery of adequate health services.

Our concerns are for the sake of our patients and our community. They can no longer be ignored. We call upon you, as Prime Minister, to support federal intervention to provide a new single-site hospital for the Albury Wodonga region.

We would appreciate any opportunity to further present our concerns.
